Sulzbacher History



- Sulzbacher opened its doors in December of 1995 as the I.M.
 Sulzbacher Center for the homeless in response to the increase of homelessness in Jacksonville and nationwide.
- The agency was founded by three groups, the City of Jacksonville, a group of area businesses, and the United Way of Northeast Florida.
- Sulzbacher was founded on the premise that people experiencing homelessness need and deserve more than just a meal and a bed to end their homelessness.



Sulzbacher Overview



SULZBACHER HOUSING • HEALTHCARE • HOPE

- Sulzbacher provides a continuum of care approach, addressing all aspects of homelessness including housing, income, and health care.
- Over more than two decades since the agency opened, the services have grown to include street outreach, primary health, behavioral health and dental care for all ages, permanent housing, job placement, and early learning.



Healthcare Services

- Primary care, Dentistry, Vision care, Psychiatry, and Addiction Medicine
- 4 locations & street outreach teams
- Free medication to bridge patient assistance programs (PAPs) to those who qualify
- Adult and Pediatrics
- School-based Clinic, Medical Respite Facility, Mobile Health Unit







Hope Team

2021-2022

Street Psychiatry performed 65 new evaluations, 131 follow up visits

- Homeless Outreach Project Expansion (HOPE)
- Medical & psychiatric outreach
- Distributes clothing, blankets, food, water, and basic hygiene items
- Case Management
- Job Placement & Training, e.g., Education, High School Equivalency, Early Learning Center, After School Program
- Urban Rest Stop

SOAR Program at Sulzbacher

Developing and Sustaining Partnerships with Medical Staff

- Since 2018, Sulzbacher in partnership with LSF Health systems has provided SOAR case management services in collaboration with:
 - Psychiatrists,
 - Psychiatric Advanced Practice Nurse Practitioners (APRNs),
 - other physicians and specialists.



Benefits of Collaboration with Medical Staff

- Medical provider available to sign Medical Summary Report.
- Able to provide updated psychiatric evaluations and medical records
- Prescribe psychiatric medications
- Complete paperwork to assist applicants with obtaining representative payee services
- Avoid Social Security scheduling consultative examinations
- SOAR case worker can advocate for applicants



SOAR Partnership with Psychiatrist

SOAR Case Worker

- Creates treatment plan from applicant input which addresses medical, financial, and housing needs
- Completes assessment and case management notes
- Links applicant to least restrictive housing placement
- Schedules and transports to medical/behavioral health appointments
- Promotes medication compliance*

Psychiatrist

- Able to travel with outreach staff to meet SOAR clients on the street, at shelters, etc.
- Able to prescribe longacting psychiatric injectables to promote long-term stability*
- Obtain medications through patience assistance program until clients are approved for benefits



Long-Acting Injectable Antipsychotics (LAIs)

- When comparing oral v. LAI: LAIs were associated with:
 - 44% fewer suicide attempts
 - 37% fewer all-cause hospitalizations
 - 48% fewer psychiatric hospitalizations for psychiatric disorders
 - 12% reduction in hospitalizations for cardiovascular diseases
 - 14% reduction in extrapyramidal symptoms
- LAIs can be used for treating schizophrenia spectrum and bipolar disorders to improve medication adherence



Treatment Plan Support: Long Acting Anti-Psychotic Injectables

Pros

- Applicants don't have to remember to take a pill(s) each day
- Helps reduce mental health relapses and hospitalizations
- May reduce arrests and repeat episodes of homelessness
- May be administered every 30 days or 90 days

Cons

- Expensive
- Applicants must be willing to receive an injection
- Possible negative side effects
- Applicants may feel they are getting better on their own and discontinue

Introduction to Outreach Community Health Centers



History

- Founded as "Healthcare for the Homeless" in 1982
- Became Outreach Community Health Centers in 2011 after becoming a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC)

Mission Statement

Promoting health and wellness to all individuals that we serve.

Vision

 Striving to be your trusted community health center by offering quality, integrated care and services that address social determinants of health.



Clinical and Community Services

 While our foundation is built primarily on providing services to those who are experiencing homelessness, we have expanded our services to fit the needs of the community we reside in to include both clinical and community services.





Services Provided

Clinical

- Primary Care Services (including dental and podiatry)
- Full Behavioral Health
 Services
- On-Site Pharmacy

Community

- 3 Tiers of Case Management
- Street Outreach/Housing
- Benefit Acquisition, e.g.,
 SOAR Case Management

Tips for Collaborating with External Medical Providers

- It can be difficult to spread the word when you don't have any contacts.
 - Be sure to include a cover letter with your medical records requests that briefly explains the SOAR Program and your work.
- Utilize Medical Assistants by providing them general information about the SOAR Program.
 - They have greater access to your applicant's clinicians, and they can assist with obtaining signatures.



Collaborating With Medical Providers (Advantages)

- If the medical provider is aware of SOAR (and understands its benefits) we can consider them as a part of the clients "care team."
 - This makes them readily available to sign Medical Summary Reports (MSRs), and complete other medical provider forms if necessary.
- There are medical providers who only include enough information to document for "billing" purposes, so we have been able to advocate for more detailed notes on behalf of the people in our program.
- With a Release of Information (ROI) in place, we can share information regarding applicants whom clinicians may not be aware of.
