My SAMHSA SOAR TA Center Liaison, Pam Heine, was also very responsive and helpful. She quickly answered my questions or directed me to someone who could assist me. This was my first time using the SOAR model so this one-on-one guidance was very helpful. I was also able to attend a workshop with other SOAR practitioners and discuss using the model and how to address barriers and challenges as they presented themselves. It was a very positive experience, and I would recommend that anyone new to SOAR utilize the

- John was approved for both SSI and SSDI benefits. He was able to secure a hotel room to stay in while being linked to a permanent and stable residence and is now able to pay rent for his own place. With his basic needs met, he is more focused on his recovery and engaged in treatment. He has experienced an improvement in his mental health symptoms and has a more positive outlook on other goals that he had placed on hold - he is considering returning to college so that he can obtain employment.

When completing the Authorization to Disclose Information to the Social Security Administration (Form SSA-<u>827)</u>, please remember to obtain an original ink signature from the applicant or their guardian. This is required by the Social Security Administration (SSA) to process disability claims. Altering the signature or date in any way violates SSA policy and puts medical providers at significant risk of releasing sensitive medical information

Electronic Folder that have altered applicant signatures and/or dates, such as displaying a picture of a signature or date that is not original.
