LEGAL SYSTEMS

This matrix is a tool to help identify key community partners to take part in your SSI/SSDI Outreach Access and Recovery (SOAR) Steering Committee. Successful SOAR implementation requires the involvement of representatives from external partners representing many community sectors, including health care, mental health care, homeless and housing services, employment and rehabilitation services, and the key federal and state agencies involved in the disability determination process. These external partners maintain effective communication between the Social Security Administration (SSA), Disability Determination Services (DDS), local leads, and SOAR case workers; discuss and resolve challenges that arise; identify technical assistance needs; and explore strategies for funding and sustainability.
